It has my pleasure and honor to see some of that harvest up close. Just a few examples:

- In recent years, Julie and I have had the delight of staying in the homes of Erin (Meyer) Tintzman ('94), and Kim (Rigg) Knudsen ('97), seeing their marriages and the way their children are being loved and trained up in the Lord.
- I have followed the overseas work in classical, Christian education of Colleen McGarry ('02), hearing from her personally and in writing. Her ministry in Iraq was faithful, fruitful, and life-changing, for her and many children.
- One of our earliest graduates, Mark Jordan ('92), has passed many rigorous tests of knowledge, as well as of character, to earn the wings of a flight attendant for Delta Airlines.
- A good number of you have gone into the military, serving

Many Firsts for Track Team

Newspaper headlines ran thick with Logos Track and Field news this season — a memorable year of firsts. It was the first time Logos won the White Pine League Championship, the first time the team has ever gone to State, the first time the team boasted more guys than girls, the first time Coach John Carnahan drove a bus to the Seattle King's meet, the first time we had a team member, Philip King, sing the National Anthem at a meet, and the list goes on and on!

The team was named the Idaho Spring Academic State Champions for 1A schools (cumulative GPA of 3.611). The girls placed first at Regionals; the boys missed first by two points! The boys finished second at State (missing first by eight points); the girls were sixth. For the first time in a long time, Coach Spencer gave out the Knight Award, which signifies school spirit and a godly attitude throughout the season — to Madison Schumaker.

For the first time since 2007, Logos pole vaulters (James Engerbretson and Bronwyn Schumaker) soared high into the sky with new records, thanks to Mr. Wayne Browning, who also coached the throwers. High jumpers were guided by returning coach Mrs. Allison Ryan, distance and middle distance runs were coached by Mr. John Carnahan, while relays, long and triple jump, hurdles, and sprinting events were coached by Mrs. Gwen Spencer. And what work these coaches did! Working their athletes hard and instilling godly strength and wisdom, they helped the team place in a winning spot in five of 11 meets.

Eight of 16 school records were broken this year; and throughout the season, athletes kept besting their personal bests. Sophomore Paul Ryan reset school records in the 1600 and 3200 meters, senior Brian Stanton set the 800 meter record, and senior Jackson Spencer beat his brother's 300 meter hurdle record (Justin Spencer set in 2004) as well as the 100 meter record. Records also fell in the boys' 4x400 and sprint medley relays, as well as the girl's 4x100 and 4x200 relays.

At State, Paul finished first (3200), second (1600), and fourth (800) in spite of a stress fracture in his foot. Brian was second (3200), third (1600 and 800); Jackson third (100 and 300 meter hurdles); Kane Berglund, third (400); Jed Whitling, sixth (high jump); Sage Pratt, eighth (3200 and 1600); boys sprint medley, second; 4x400, fifth; Madison, third (high jump), fifth (400); sister #1 Brooklyn, seventh (1600), fifth (long jump), fourth (triple jump); sister #2 Bronwyn, seventh (200), sixth (triple jump); Autumn Pratt, fifth (1600), sixth (800), eighth (3200); and girls 4x200, fourth

Our many senior stars, the catalyst behind the team's winning ways, will be greatly missed next season. Nonetheless, the future looks promising. Eighth graders broke several junior high records this season: Jackson Dickison (400, 800, and 1600 meters), Miles Whitling (triple and high jump), Noel Saunders (200 meters, 75 and 200 meter hurdles), and Erica Johnson (triple and high jump).

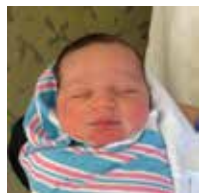
