

Bigger and Better Every Year

Each year brings many exciting changes; and this year was no exception at Logos. The school upgraded its information system, added more classrooms, said goodbye to some wonderful staff members, and welcomed many new faces.

Renweb, the new online information system, allows parents to see their children's grades and behavioral records, streamlining communication between parents and teachers. According to Mr. Loren Euhus, the Logos registrar, high enrollment numbers rendered paper attendance



In addition to Renweb oversight and teaching his regular classes, Mr. Euhus replaced Mrs. Charlene Polek, taking on new duties as registrar and senior class advisor. During her 13 valuable years at Logos, Mrs. Polek instituted the school's first database.

In addition to advancing technologically, Logos also added a new classroom to each of its elementary portables. Each portable now holds three classrooms instead of two. Preschool, First Grade, and Second Grade are held in one portable while Third, Fourth, and Fifth Grades are held in the other. Another

sheets and a limited-access database on a single computer impractical. "As the school gets bigger," he explained, "it just gets overwhelming." This year, the Logos enrollment is 363 students with 235 elementary students and 128 secondary students.

Renweb "has opened (the school's database) so many different people can access it," Mr. Euhus said. "Whatever your role, you can access it to do what you want." Principal Matt Whitling has also found the system helpful. "We are very pleased with Renweb," he said. "So far feedback from parents and teachers is very positive."

This year, only secondary teachers are required to use Renweb to post grades and record attendance and behavior. Starting next year, the whole school will use it. Mr. Euhus is overseeing the transition to Renweb, assisted by student intern Trevor Morse. classroom of each grade is still taught in the main Logos building.

The first day of school introduced students to many new teachers. Mrs. Kirsten Miller, mother of five current Logos students and one graduate, is the new first grade teacher. She took over from Mrs. Laura (Shaw) Leithart who moved out of the area after her wedding this summer.

Miss Chantelle Courtney, a 2008 alumna, and Mrs. Micaela Blum, mother of four Logos students, team-teach one of the second grade classes, formerly taught by Miss Chelsea Jones. In order to accommodate steadily increasing enrollment numbers, Logos added a second fifth grade class, led by Mr. Jim Becker (Fun fact: Mr. Becker has run 53 marathons.)

Jovial janitor, Mr. Andrew Isker, added the U.S. History

Whose Story Are You Gonna Believe?

Unbeknownst to many at Logos currently, I was privileged to be the elementary principal at Logos for our first 19 years. That meant, as it does now for Mr. Whitling, that there were many times when I had to judge the merits of two differing stories of what exactly happened at recess.

I would have two little boys (of course) sitting in front of me, with or without blood being present, and it was my job to discern the truth of whose story was likely the

It has been my privilege to teach our sophomores a fall semester class on the history of the War Between the States, or the Civil War, as it's more commonly called. The story of this war that I was taught (as are most Americans) was this: Before 1861 the South was a wicked place full of evil slave-owners who incessantly beat and killed their slaves. The North was a wonderful, moral place full of compassionate people who hated slavery and racism. So the North

correct one. (Most often the truth was a mix of the two tales; there was enough guilt to spread around.)

Many times I had to take a page from C.S. Lewis's first Narnia book, *The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrobe*. At one point, the Professor is trying to help Peter and Susan determine who is telling the truth about the wardrobe's magic powers: Edmund or Lucy. Lucy told her siblings that the magic was real but Edmund said he and Lucy were 'just pretending.'

"That is a point," said the Professor, "which certainly deserves consideration; very careful consideration. For instance — if you will excuse me for asking the question — does your experience lead you to regard your brother or your sister as the more reliable? I mean, which is the more truthful?"

"That's just the funny thing about it, sir," said Peter. "Up till now, I'd have said Lucy every time." The Professor then strongly encourages Peter and Susan to be extremely careful about accusing a normally trustworthy person of lying.

A few weeks ago Julie and I took several days to visit our daughter's family in New York City. Among the many fascinating sites we saw was the American Museum of Natural History (complete with a large statue of Theodore Roosevelt on a horse out front!). It's an immense museum full of a delightful variety of stuffed animals, posed in lifelike positions in beautiful dioramas similar to their natural habitats.

In the wing for fish and other water fauna, there was a large open theater area (directly under a full-scale replica of a blue whale!). A short film was running over and over, telling the same story again and again. We sat down and witnessed the story of how life began on earth, sometime "over four billion years ago."

It was the same story of mindless evolution repeated in various ways throughout the museum. So, under one massive roof there is the tiny mouse monkey (less than 3 inches long) and the gigantic blue whale on display, and millions of visitors are told again and again: "These animals have a common ancestor! Don't ask us for transitional forms — we don't have those to put on display, but you MUST believe us — we are scientists!" fought the South to free the slaves and end slavery for all time. Naturally the North won, since they were in the right, and the South was taught its lesson and life improved for all Americans.

The only problem with this story is that much of it is not true. In reading original sources, quotes, biographies, and studying works of very smart people I discovered a very different version of the story of this war. There is not time or space here to get into what is still a very controversial story. Just one example: the life and character of Confederate General Robert E. Lee. Any honest study of this man's life and words should cause a thinking person to admit that there may be more to the real story than what is popularly believed. For Christians, it's far more significant and compelling. If ever a man was a godly Christian, General Lee was that man. Which begs the question: Whose story do we believe? Lee's or modern historians'?

At Logos we talk and teach a lot about 'world views.' Another way of examining a person's 'world view' is simply this: "Whose story do they believe?" We tell children and each other stories all the time. The world tells us stories all the time, too: "You need to reduce your carbon footprint because man is a cancer on the planet!"

Yet we know not all stories are true, even if many people believe them. Sincerely believing the wrong thing doesn't make it true, either. "In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth." From that truth, *all* other stories must be evaluated. His story, as written in His Word and expressed through His Son, is our best, our only infallible measure for determining who is lying and who is telling us the truth in every story we hear.

Not only do we want to help train many students to be 'Lucys' who are known for telling and loving the truth, we want to be as wise as the Professor in the process. Please pray for us toward that end.

Enrollment 2013-14 Record Number of International Students Attend Logos

A record number of international students attend Logos this year: 20 secondary and three elementary students. Korean is heard in the hallways and classrooms and around the lunch tables. Would you like to learn about another country? Ask the Koreans in the third row or the Nigerians in the second.

So why Logos? How did they find us? About a generation ago, Mr. Jim Wilson, whose son Mr. Douglas Wilson helped found Logos, started a Bible study for Korean students at the University of Idaho. Many of his students became Christians through his witness, then moved back to South Korea (taking a high opinion of Logos home with them) and started families of their own. A child of one of Mr. Wilson's students was the first Korean student to attend Logos. Juhyeon Park arrived at Logos in 1996 and graduated the same school year.

As Superintendent Tom Garfield said, "The word spread from there. (Korean parents) have a strong desire to have their children in a private school in the United States." Children of Mr. Wilson's students, then cousins, then friends began to cross the Pacific Ocean to attend Logos. Today, six Korean students attend Logos on the recommendation of Mr. Youngmok Jeong, father of two Logos seniors. Mr. Jeong owns an academy in Korea called JYM English Academy. He acts as coordinating agent to students who wish to study in America.

In addition to swelling numbers of South Korean students, students from Taiwan and even Vietnam have chosen Logos in the past. Today, several Nigerian students attend Logos as well. This year's senior class includes seven international students.

How could anyone manage Logos coursework in a second language 1000s of miles from home? Logos requires international students to speak English, have a home to board in, and understand the basics of Christianity.

In addition, Mrs. Paula Jones, fourth grade teacher at Logos, is the International Student Director, a new position this year. She welcomed new international students with an orientation at the beginning of the year and supplements

Principal Matt Whitling stated, "The school's goal is to have a maximum of three international students in each (secondary) class. The school is a blessing to (international students). They get a classical and Christian education. And they can also learn English from native speakers." Mr. Whitling went on to explain that international students are also a blessing to the school.

International students are truly interesting people. After all, a diverse student body makes a fun school.

ur Logos Boys Cross Country team once again made it to the Idaho State Championships. They missed first place at Districts by only one point!

Idaho Falls hosted the State meet on November 2, about nine hours from Moscow. We had a safe trip down the Friday before the meet, leaving around 5:00 a.m., and previewed the course as soon as we got into town.

After a pep-talk from our coach, Mrs. Allison Ryan, on Saturday morning, the team took the field. Mrs. Ryan said, "I am so proud of all of you." It was a difficult course at altitude (4700 feet as compared to nearly 2600 in Moscow), but we pushed through and placed a respectable fifth out of 16 teams in the 1A-2A Division race.

Our highest placer, freshman Jackson Dickison, came in eighth place overall. Other team members included: (seniors) Sage Pratt and Jonathan Nance, (juniors) Paul Ryan, Sean Stanton, Jameson Evans, and Gaven Dooley, (sophomores) Everett Plotner and Josiah Anderson, and (freshman) Preston Evans.

The Logos harriers met each morning before school at 6:30 a.m. and put in a lot of hard work. They proved to be great team members and enjoyed running together. Many people set their personal bests over the 5K distance. (That's 3.1 miles, folks.) One highlight of the year was participating at the SunFair Invitational in Yakima, Washington, where about 2000 runners competed.

The team dealt with significant adversity in the form of injuries. Though the Knights won State last year, State competitors from that season, Jonny Handel and Levi Wintz, were out for the entire season. Paul Ryan missed the first half of the season and Sean Stanton sustained an injury just before State.

The team is looking forward to next year when, Lord willing, we will aim to compete for the State title again. Paul Ryan and Jackson Dickison will continue to train for the Nike Cross Nationals Northwest race in Boise on November 16.

Wo Logos seniors have been honored in the 59th annual National Merit Scholarship Program. Shane Stokes has been named a Semifinalist, while Sage Pratt is a Commended student.

About 1.5 million juniors in more than 22,000 high schools entered the 2014 National Merit Scholarship Program by taking the 2012 Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT[®]), which served as an initial screen of program entrants. The nationwide pool of Semifinalists, representing less than one percent of U.S. high school seniors, includes the highest-scoring entrants in each state. The number of Semifinalists in a state is proportional to the state's percentage of the national total of graduating seniors.

More than two-thirds (about 34,000) of the approximately 50,000 high scorers on the PSAT/NMSQT[®] receive Letters of Commendation in recognition of their outstanding academic promise. Commended Students are named on the basis of a nationally applied Selection Index score that may vary from year to year and is typically below the level required for participants to be named Semifinalists in their respective states.
