Boys' and Girls' Track Teams Win State Championships

In 1 Corinthians 9:24, God commands us to, "run in such a way as to get the prize." Throughout Logos' track history our athletes have endeavored to live out this verse. In the first two years of becoming a full member of the IHSAA, the boys earned second place twice while the girls were in the top 10 both years at State. [This year the Knights' boys' and girls' teams took home the gold at State.](#)

Throughout the regular season, team members trained hard. At the Whitepine League Championship, the girls came home with the first place trophy and the boys took second. At the Meet of Champions Paul Ryan ran, at that time, the second fastest 800m nationally for a high school boy.

During the two-day span of Districts, the girls took first place and the boys came in second to Kamiah. The top five in each event and top two relays then headed to State in Middleton, near Boise.

After a six-hour trip, the Knights arrived in Middleton and went to the track first thing. The next day dawned dark and stormy. Nonetheless, the boys' long distance team was able to snag the first, second, fourth, sixth, and seventh places in the 3200m. Paul Ryan led this race its entire length and

broke his own State record time, followed by Levi Wintz, Josiah Anderson, Jonny Handel, and Jackson Dickison. Megan Dye took fourth in the girls' 3200m.

Throughout the rest of the day, the team competed in preliminary sprints and some field events. Naomi Miller took fourth in the discus. Both the boys' and girls' relay teams won the medley relay. Claire Ahmann took second in the high jump.

The first day of State was finished but the next day would bring the finals of the sprinting events and some field events with a scattering of long distance races and relays. Noel Saunders placed seventh in the pole vault.

The following morning was bright and clear. The meet started off with some field events and then "The Parade of Athletes." In the 100m hurdles, Claire Ahmann took sixth, then the girls' 4x200 relay finished second. In the 100m dash, Ruth Saunders placed second.

In the girls' 800m race, freshmen Keidi Anderson and Maddie Wintz finished second and sixth, respectively. Paul Ryan took first in the 800m, breaking an old State record,


Logos School Report of Giving 2014/2015






with Levi Wintz close on his heels at second. The girls' relay team placed second in the 4x100m that followed.

Next Ruth Saunders took gold in the 400m. Paul Ryan also finished first in the 400m with a nail biting finish. The 300m hurdles were next with Noel Saunders taking fourth. Ruth Saunders was able to take bronze in the 200m dash. Only two events were left in the day, the 1600m followed by the 4x400m relay. In the 1600m, freshmen Megan Dye and Maddie Wintz came in second and fifth place, respectively.

The "Fab Five" dominated the boys' 1600m. Paul Ryan led this race followed by Levi Wintz, Josiah Anderson and Jonny Handel with Jackson Dickison in seventh. Coach Carnahan said about this race, "We knew it was coming...Still it's neat to pop up the standings right there at the end of the meet." In the 4x400m that followed the girls took sixth, and the boys, with three out of their four boys having just run the mile, came in seventh. After all the number crunching was complete, the Knights came out on top getting first place for the boys and the girls.

Exemplary Achievement Honors for Athletic Program

The Idaho High School Athletic Association awarded Logos Exemplary Achievement Status for 2014-15 in 1A Division II.

This is the result of a year-long, voluntary program in which schools earn points based on their student-athletes' performance in the classroom, at the athletic venue, in activities' competitions and in the area of citizenship and sportsmanship.

The top school in each division is named a *School of Excellence*. Schools of each classification that finish second and third in the final point compilation are awarded *Exemplary Achievement Status*, while schools that score 90% on the Citizenship Component and have no player/coach ejections throughout the year or incidents of unsportsmanlike school behavior at state tournaments receive an *Award of Excellence* certificate.

The 1A Division II awards went to Number 1 Community School (*School of Excellence*), Number 2 Lighthouse Christian and Number 3 Logos (*Exemplary Achievement*), and Lighthouse Christian, Garden Valley and Clark County (*Award of Excellence*). There are 39 schools in the 1A Division II.

Lacrosse goes the extra mile(s) in 2015

Change marked the lacrosse season for the Knights: new league, new coach, new players.

After seven years in the North Idaho Lacrosse League, Logos joined the Idaho High School Lacrosse League, along with three other former NILL teams (Coeur d'Alene, Lake City and Moscow). Because lacrosse is not a sanctioned sport by the Idaho High School Athletic Association, the IHSL is the governing body of the high school boys' lacrosse teams through the state of Idaho.

The League has two divisions. Logos participated in Division 2 with the following teams (enrollments from the IHSAA website): Capital (1808), Wood River (805), Borah (2081), Emmett (703), Ambrose (121), Vallivue (1933), Meridian (1512), Skyview (1296), Moscow (747), and Logos (92).

Wes Struble, involved with Logos lacrosse for over 20 years, took the reins from Ben Merkle. The 17-man roster included eight returners and nine new players. "We started with an inexperienced team and ended with seasoned veterans with a good outlook for next year," said Coach Struble.

Since most of the opposing teams reside in Boise, Logos began league play with six games on three consecutive Saturdays, leaving Moscow at 5 a.m. and returning around midnight. Over the following three Saturdays, the Knights hosted opponents on the UI SprinTurf field with the last two regular season games in Riggins at Salmon River High School. Activities Director John Carnahan commented that the school vans traveled the equivalent of a one way trip to New York City

over the course of the season.

Logos finished fourth of five in Group 1 (of two groups) with a 3-12 record. They beat Moscow twice and Payette County once. The season ended on May 13 in Boise with a quarterfinal loss against undefeated (and eventual Division 2 State Champion) Capital.

Senior Sean Stanton was the only player from a north Idaho team to earn a place on the all star team (attack/2nd team) with 53 of Logos' 102 goals in 14 regular season games, the second highest goal tally in Division 2. This year's roster included returners: seniors Jameson Evans, Chaeun Kim, Sean Stanton; junior

Jon Morris; and sophomores Preston Evans, Andy Handel, Luke Mason, Knox Merkle. The new players included: senior Stocker Lloyd; sophomores Alexander Berglund, Thomas Black, Cole Brusven, Boden Lloyd, Andrew Pilchard; and freshmen Cody Adams, Eston Berglund, and Zachary Ewell.

The junior high team was coached by Kyle Morse ('09), all conference player for the University of Idaho. Assisted by Kyle's brother, Trevor ('14), last year's NILL co-MVP, the boys finished the season 4-3. The roster included: eighth graders Ben Euhus, Talis Meyer, Nate Miller, and Bennett Schlect; seventh graders Joe Ahmann, Isaac Blum, David Handel, Jadon Nuttbrock, Rory Wilson; and sixth graders Alex Blum, Connor Costello, Kaden Kibling, Gavin Smith, and Jared Stokes.
