 $m{D}$ ack in 1960, the musical Camelot* was produced for the first time on Broadway. It tells the fictional sad story of King Arthur, his queen Guenevere, Sir Lancelot and the knights of the round table, all within the amazing kingdom of Camelot. When Arthur first meets Guenevere, he sings to her of the wonders and magic of Camelot:

A law was made a distant moon ago here July and August cannot be too hot And there's a legal limit to the snow here in Camelot

The winter is forbidden till December And exits March the second on the dot *By order, summer lingers through* September in Camelot

The rain may never fall till after sundown By eight, the morning fog must disappear In short, there's simply not a more congenial spot For happy-ever-after-ing than here in Camelot

The snow may never slush upon the hillside By nine p.m. the moonlight must appear *In short, there's simply* not a more congenial spot For happy-ever-after-ing than here in Camelot

Arthur, having received an education ahead of his time under the tutelage of Merlin the magician, earnestly seeks to build a just and thriving kingdom in Camelot, somewhere in England. His ideals for having justice and liberty through the land are to be promulgated by his hand-picked knights.

The snake in the garden is Lancelot. He seduces Arthur's queen, Guenevere. All Arthur's work begins to unravel and the kingdom eventually collapses into civil war.

At the end, Arthur, broken-hearted in the midst of the devastation of his country and castle, comes across a young boy named Tom. Tom has heard tales of the wondrous Camelot. Arthur's spirits rally and he encourages Tom to remember all that once was Camelot:

Ask ev'ry person if he's heard the story, And tell it strong and clear if he has not, *That once there was a fleeting* wisp of glory Called Camelot. Camelot! Camelot! Over the years of working in and loving Logos School, I have frequently been overwhelmed by God's goodness to this school. Time and time again He has not only blessed us beyond my deepest desires, He has also brought us through trials I was sure would close our doors.

Sometimes the sweetness of working with these children is beyond my ability to articulate. Seeing and hearing the joy that parents often express lifts my soul. God has brought together a truly amazing set of teachers and staff members who just continue to impress me by their devotion to Christ, these students, and this work.

So how does Camelot's story figure into the beauty and work of Logos School? Doug Wilson has more than once referred to me as a Puddleglum, and he's been right. In fairness, I think part of my job is to try to anticipate how things could go wrong, and ideally plan to keep those things from happening.

Put simply, I pray I may not live to see the day that someone would have cause to remark, "Oh yeah, I remember Logos School in its heyday. It was a really strong Christian school then. The kids were happy and the grads were amazing! Man, you'd never know that now!"

There are many sad stories in Scripture that follow the same arc: a rise from obscurity, overcoming trials and hardships, finally a 'golden age', then some kind of sin tolerated, and finally a total collapse. There are individual stories like Saul's, on up to the rise and fall of the nation of Israel.

Or Solomon's age of peace and prosperity, the building of the glorious temple, then unfaithfulness on the part of the people of God, followed by the destruction of the temple by pagans, not once, but twice! God clearly does not regard great works the same way men do; He will destroy anything that

Capturing the Essence of Intrigue

tale of intrigue. A tale of love. A tale of war. This perfectly captures the essence of the Logos High School varsity drama production this year, *The Three Musketeers*.

This play was directed by Mrs. Heather Lloyd, who was new to directing Logos productions, though definitely not new to theater. She freely adapted a version of the play so it would better encompass all the wonderful elements of a story: conflict, suspense, humor, and resolution. She did an admirable job, not only of arranging a wonderful storyline, but also bringing the plot to life through high school students.

Mrs. Lloyd said, "Working with the Logos students on *The Three Musketeers* made directing easy. They came prepared for practice, well versed in their lines and remembered blocking from previous days — all of this made putting *The Three Musketeers* together a delight. The students really made the story come alive and the performances intriguing."

The Three Musketeers is set in England in the 1600's. The whole play is speckled with hilarious soliloquies by Planchet (Preston Evans), the "mere servant" who follows the Three Musketeers around. The curtain opens on a young lad (Luke Mason) by the name of D'Artagnan, a soldier eager to join the Musketeers of the Guard: Aramis (Danny Bradley), Athos (Thomas Sensing), and Porthos (Jon Morris.) D'Artagnan soon joins the group under the instruction of Monsieur de Treville (Boden Lloyd), and the four become a heroic powerhouse throughout the rest of the show.

However, all good stories contain conflict. The evil Cardinal Richelieu (Ethan Howell) uses his equally devilish agent, Milady de Winter (Sofia Minudri) to plot against King Louis (Nathan Miller) and his wife, Queen Anne (Sonya Isenberg.) Throughout the story, the antagonists use secret letters and a priceless necklace to frame the good, albeit naïve, characters.

Milady, torn from her old love for Athos, and the

Cardinal, fueled by his past crush on Queen Anne, and Lord Buckingham (Knox Merkle), confused by his unrequited love for the Queen, make this storyline delightfully complicated. Furthermore, D'Artagnan has his own share of love when he falls for the beautiful Queen's lady in waiting, Constance (Claire Ahmann.)

In an intense scene, Athos stumbles upon Milady after years of thinking she was dead. Milady attempts to make Athos fall for her again, without success. All was quiet in the theater


Musketeers are applauded for their courageous efforts, D'Artagnan is knighted, and he marries Constance.
