Benefit Auction Hits New Heights

nthusiasm for Logos School hit new heights at this year's "Red Carpet Cowboy" Benefit Auction. Not only did more people attend than ever, the auction raised more money than ever.

God truly blessed the efforts of about 40 volunteers led by Logos Development staff and the steering committee of Paula Casebolt, Kelly Driskill, Rachel Jankovic, Lauren McMurray, and Kim Minudri. More than 140 packages sold through live and silent auction with contributions from 114 businesses and 56 individuals. Thanks also goes to Moscow Family Dentistry and 23 other businesses who contributed more than \$22,000 through various sponsorships.

The \$61,000 raised beat the previous record of \$40,000 in 2012. The number of attendees rose from a previous high of 220 to 270.

The auction item that raised the most money for Logos was a *Summer Evening Feast for 35 Friends*—a dinner of roast

lamb, taboule salad, desserts and wine hosted by Dave & Ann Casebolt and Francis & Donna Foucachon. It sold for \$7,400!

Oh, The Things You Will See!

Tt's overcast on an early Saturday morning. Anyone with sense would be at home, possibly still in bed, or at least sipping a hot beverage and easing into the day. But in a classroom at Logos more than a dozen otherwise normal teens are already working hard. They are sitting before open notebooks, listening to a bearded local attorney explain the way to deal with hearsay objections.

"You need to remember

Otherwise you won't be able to deal with the objection!" The other coach chimes in: "Of course, if you can also use the evidence to your advantage, that would take the cake!"

in their notebooks, as though they fully understand all that's been said. Which they do, as is demonstrated by their followup questions.

Over and over, the Logos Mock Trial A and B teams, run their case, with attorneys directing and crossing witnesses. The witnesses, in turn, concentrate on expressing their story and fleshing out their characters.

Regardless of 20 years of watching and working with our Mock Trial teams, I never cease to be amazed at these kids. It's not just their keen minds and pleasant demeanor. It's the whole unique picture! My own teen years and attendant questionable use of time are seared in my memory. These students are light years more mature than I was at their age! I don't even have a good excuse: I was raised in a very godly home by two of the strongest Christians I've ever known. Nevertheless, my faith and my education never complimented each other as they do in the lives of these, and many other young adults at Logos.

It's Friday morning in the Logos auditorium. Being dress uniform day, the young children seated in scattered pairs around the lunch tables look very sharp. But that's not what causes me to pause as I pass through the room. This is one of my favorite times of the week because it's when the sixth graders pair up with first graders to hear the younger ones read aloud from a book. Some of the pairs are siblings; these are easy to spot, not just from their similar looks, but from the arm of the older one around the shoulders of the younger one.

All the pairs are concentrating on their delightful story, broken only by the occasional quiet correction:

"That word is a funny one," says the wise elder, "It's 'bounced', see the "b" at the beginning?" And they go on with the story line.

I look from one pair to another. There is no impatience or body language indicating the older students would rather be somewhere else. There is also no need for

who the party opponent is, and apply the appropriate rule. a looming teacher to keep them on task - it's obvious all the children are enjoying this short quiet time together.

It's Friday night in the Logos gym and a ball is literally And these otherwise normal teens eagerly make notes in full swing! The music is not too loud but it fills the room, matched in decibel level by shouts of laughter as the secondary students fly through the complicated steps of the Posties Jig. Overhead the chandelier glows. The elementary students had their time on the dance floor earlier. Now the 7th through 12th graders are dashing between rows of bodies, grabbing a hand, spinning wildly to the next partner. No slow waltzes for these full-tilt students! They do many of the same dances as the young ones, but at Autobahn speed. As they finish, gasping and grinning, the boys take the hand of their lovely partners and escort them off the floor. Then they all make their way to the refreshment table to drink gallons of water and shove down some cookies.

> On this night I am one of the chaperones. Two pairs of unknown teens enter the gym. I go over to greet them and they tell me that they are MHS students, invited to the dance by some church friends who attend Logos. The boys are in t-shirts and jeans, the girls are wearing dresses that wouldn't pass muster normally. I let them all know the basic rules:

- 1. The guys need ties.
- 2. They can dance one dance with their "friend," then the guys need to seek a different girl for each of the rest of the dances.
- 3. Get to know the other kids here.

They readily agree to the rules. I fetch two ties from the drama costume closet. The guys put them on and they all charge off into the fray. As I spot them from time to time through evening, I see them all mingling and mixing with the other students.

The dance ends on time and the students gather to thank the caller and sing the Doxology. The two public school voung men seek me out, hand me back the ties, and all four students thank me. I ask them if they enjoyed it: "Oh yeah! It was a blast! Our dances aren't like this; this was really fun!" the girls exclaim. I encourage them to come again. The lights

Engineering Team Places First at Regional Competition

The newly formed Logos Engineering team took first place out of seven teams at the regional Tests of Engi- neering Aptitude, Mathematics, and Science (TEAMS) competition on March 4 at Moscow High School. Logos scored 50 out of 80 points. They edged out second-place Moscow A by 2 points.

"Rebekah Kim really was the powerhouse behind this team," said Coach Jim Nance. "She organized the meetings and the practices, and worked hard to encourage everyone to do their best." Other team members included: seniors Joonyoung Ahn, Jay Cho, Alicia Jeong, Jonathan Nance, Seonghun Park, Nellie Yager, and sophomore Jason Yoon.

The TEAMS program is an annual STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics) competition that helps students discover their potential for engineering. The competition has two parts: solving problems and essay writing. The March event had 80 problems based on scenarios about urban planning (this year's theme). The teams were given descriptions, graphs, charts, and equations, and from this information had to solve 80 problems in 90 minutes.

ogos senior Shane Stokes is among the approximately 15,000 ■finalists in the 59th Annual National Merit Scholarship Program.

To become a finalist, a semifinalist must have an outstanding academic record throughout high school, be endorsed and recommended by the school principal, and earn SAT scores that confirm the student's earlier qualifying test performance. The

semifinalist and a school official must submit a detailed scholarship application, which includes the student's selfdescriptive essay and information about the semifinalist's participation and leadership in school and community activities.

Shane, who entered Logos in 2007 as a sixth grader, plans to pursue a degree in Mechanical Engineering at the University of Idaho. Over the past 18 years, Logos has had 40 National Merit Finalists and 22 commended students.

Young Mock Trial Teams Finish Second and Third at State

Logos A, the 15-time State Champion, faced off against Ambrose A in an epic struggle for the Idaho State Mock Trial Championship. After finishing second to Logos five times in the past seven years, Ambrose was crowned the 2014 Idaho State Champion.

The case this year contained a mythical daredevil being sued by the city of Twin Falls for a failed jump over the Snake River and the riot that followed. This year the Logos A team was composed of senior Shane Stokes, juniors Jameson Evans, Elizabeth Schlect, sophomores Daniel Bradley, Sonya Isenberg, Sofia Minudri, and freshmen Luke Mason and Emma Story.

Arguing for the B team was junior Emilie Dye, along with freshmen Jackson Dickison, Preston Evans, Ethan Howell, Erica Johnson, Emily Littlejohn, Knox Merkle, and Miles Whitling. Despite their youth, both teams won at regionals and prepared themselves to face the best mock trial teams in Idaho.

At the state competition, the Logos A team, sailed into the semifinals undefeated. Meanwhile the Logos B team lost to Centennial but beat Ambrose A, qualifying for the semifinals on the last day of competition. In the semifinals the two Logos teams went head to head. Logos A eventually prevailed, earning them a spot in the championship round.

From the semifinal matchup, Sofia Minudri (Logos A) was awarded an outstanding attorney award and Ethan Howell (Logos B) won an outstanding witness award. Shane Strokes

earned perfect scores from all the judges and was recognized as the outstanding witness in the championship round.

The teams were coached by Chris Schlect (A team), Latah County Prosecuting Attorney Bill Thompson, Melissa Dow (B team), and Tom Garfield. Coach Schlect said, "I was delighted with Logos' valiant performance, which in my judgment surpassed many of our performances in previous years that were good enough to win championships. Logos was good, but Ambrose was too! Hats off to them."




