Teacher Feature

25 is a Good Number

After 25 years of teaching Logos School's youngest students, Jan Sawyer is retiring.

“It's been a good ride,” the kindergarten teacher said. “I loved it. It is so fun to see the lights come on” as children progress from nonreader to reader. A bonus was the pleasure of teaching each of her 11 grandchildren as kindergartners.

The Sawyers first became a part of Logos in 1982 when their eldest child, Stephen, started third grade. It was only Logos' second year.

Stephen had previously attended public schools but expressed a desire to have school friends and teachers who were Christians. Jan and husband John decided to give Logos a try. Before Logos, “we had never seen a Christian school we liked,” Jan said. Where other schools focused on Do's and Don'ts, “Logos cared about the kid's soul,” she said.

Each of the Sawyer kids graduated from Logos: Stephen in 1992, Paula (Casebolt) in 1994, and Kelly (Driskill) in 1996. As Jan's children were wrapping up their school days, her twin sister Jeanette, asked what she'd do next. “I can see myself working with children,” Jan remembered saying. Thus the seed was planted, so when former superintendent Tom Garfield came calling in 1993, Jan took on the job of teaching preschoolers.

In 1999-00, she taught kindergarten in the morning and preschool in the afternoon. “It was so time consuming,” Jan recalled. Since Fall 2000, she has exclusively taught kindergartners.

“That age is so enthusiastic!” Jan said. “I get energy from it. Everything is a discovery!” For example on a class hike, “You can't believe how long it takes to get to the top of Kamiak!” Jan joyfully exclaimed. Five- and six-year-olds frequently stop to examine bugs and so many other items of interest along the way.

Jan grew up with her five siblings on a farm in Coeur d'Alene, before it became a center for tourism. “It was a logging town,” she said. “We were country kids.” She met John at a church camp when she was 15. They married four years later. The Sawyers moved to Moscow in 1975 so John could attend the University of Idaho.

Why retire now? “I thought 25 years was a good number,” Jan said with a grin. What's next? Jan and her husband love the outdoors — sailing, hiking, kayaking, and tooling around the countryside in their Jeep — so there will be more time for those activities. Retirement will also give Jan time to follow her grandchildren's activities and “play” with her sisters.

May God bless you, Jan, as you have so richly blessed us at Logos over these past 25 years.

Mock Trial Finishes Second at State Competition

For the third time in the last seven years, Ambrose narrowly defeated Logos to claim the Idaho State Mock Trial Championship.

The Logos teams were young this year. The A team, coached by Mr. Chris Schlect, included juniors Laina Wyrick, Bennett Schlect, Nate Miller, and Talis Meyer; sophomores Jake Hughes, Judah Rauch, and John Sensing; and freshman Josiah Rauch. The B team, coached by Mr. Gresham Schlect '10, included sophomores Elli Story, Isabelle Breese, and Cam Vis; and freshmen Alex Blum, Ronen Wyrick, Isaiah Hewitt, Ava Driskill, Kayte Casebolt, and Kalkidan Meyer.

This year Idaho mock trial teams tried a civil case which dealt with landlord and tenant issues.

Logos A and B were the only two undefeated teams at the North Idaho Regional Mock Trial competition. They advanced along with Moscow A and Lewiston A to the state mock trial tournament in Boise. Regional competition judges recognized the following people for their outstanding individual performances: Logos A attorneys Nate Miller and Bennett Schlect, and witness Jake Hughes; and Logos B attorney Isabelle Breese.

Twelve teams, representing three regions from Idaho and Montana, competed at the state tournament. All

teams competed in four preliminary rounds. Four teams advanced to compete in semifinal rounds, and the two semifinal winners met in the championship round at the Idaho Supreme Court.

Four team members were among the 16 to be recognized as outstanding witnesses: Jake Hughes, Josiah Rauch, and Talis Meyer from Logos A; and Kayte Casebolt from

Logos B. Eighteen individuals were recognized as outstanding attorneys, including: Nate Miller from Logos A; and Isabelle Breese and Cam Vis from Logos B.

In the semifinal round, Logos A prevailed over Logos B in a split ballot. Judges recognized Kalkidan Meyer (Logos B) as the outstanding attorney and Kayte Casebolt (Logos B) as the outstanding witness. In the other courtroom, Ambrose A defeated Ambrose B. This set the stage for another Logos A vs. Ambrose A showdown for the state championship.

Ambrose A prevailed over Logos, in a 2-1 split decision. Judges named Ambrose's Alethea Chaney as the outstanding attorney, and Logos' Josiah Rauch as the outstanding witness.

The win earns Ambrose the privilege of representing Idaho at the National High School Mock Trial Championships in Reno, NV, on May 10-12. Since 1995, Logos teams have won 17 Idaho State championships.

Academic State Champions

Boys' Basketball Looks Toward a Bright Future

Low turnout and a youthful roster resulted in a difficult rebuilding year for the varsity boys basketball team. However, off the court, the boys earned the [1A DII Academic State Champions award](#) this season. This award is presented to the varsity team in each classification that achieves the highest cumulative grade point average. The Knights averaged 3.78.

Led again by Coach Matt Whitling, the team did come away with a big win against longtime Whitepine League rival, the Kendrick Tigers. After falling to the Tigers in a close game early in the season, the Knights came back to beat Kendrick 58-50.

Additionally, the varsity team beat league opponent Nez Perce twice, 41-39 and 45-37. These wins and numerous close losses led the varsity team to a [league record of 3-7, an overall record of 3-13, and a 5th place league standing.](#)

In spite of the challenging season, Coach Whitling has much to look forward to next season. The team is striving for excellence, and another year's growth in age, strength, and wisdom may offer the edge needed to achieve their goals.

Some of this future potential is manifested in the scorebook, with stats like Ben Euhus' 3 point percentage (42%), Nic Minudri's assists (26) and steals (30), Bennett Schlect's total points (157), Nate Miller's blocks (17) and rebounds (96), and Isaac Blum's free throw percentage (74%).



This year's Logos Knights varsity team included seniors David Kayode-Popoola and Calvin Michaels; juniors Ben Euhus, Nate Miller, Nic Minudri (Captain), and Bennett Schlect (Captain); and sophomore swingers Joseph Ahmann, Isaac Blum, Jonah Grieser, and Rory Wilson. The undersized junior varsity team consisted of the five swingers with freshmen Zach Miller and Gavin Smith.

The JV team was coached by Arden Skoglund. In his second year with the program, Coach Skoglund led the JV to a record of 7-9 in competitions which were generally half-games as the team had only seven eligible players.

Another aspect of the boys' basketball program's potential lies at the junior high level. The undefeated junior high teams this year included 14 eighth graders, a number that has the possibility to double the size of the high school program

next year.

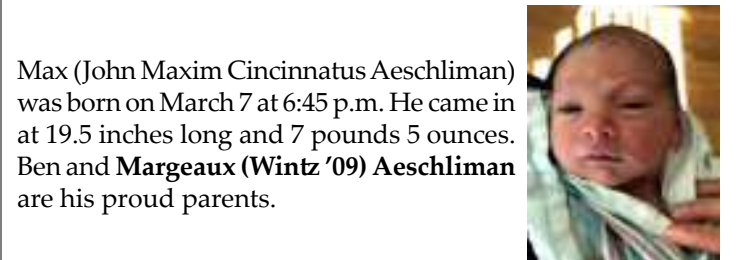
