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Establishing a Decidedly Christian Education

When we first started Logos School, almost four decades ago now, we settled on a motto that promised “a classical and Christ-centered education.” There were two pitfalls we wanted to avoid, and each part of that phrase put up a gate to keep us from going down that particular road.

The word *classical* meant that while we were interested in instilling the educational basics, in the three R’s sense, we were not interested in providing a truncated education. We wanted to teach all subjects as parts of an integrated whole, with Scriptures at the center.

The second emphasis—Christ-centered—meant that we wanted an education that was *decidedly* Christian. All things cohere in Jesus Christ (Col. 1:17-18), and so that includes everything that falls under the first heading of *classical*.

Too often Christian schools assume that the spiritual aspect of the education can be added to a basic (neutral) curriculum. But a true Christ-centered education is a function, not of addition, but rather of integration. In other words, it is not as though we have so many subjects, hanging like so many shirts on a clothesline, and then a Christian school just adds an extra shirt—chapel, say, or Bible class. No, the Scriptures have to occupy a place in the education that is comparable to the position the sun has in the solar system.

The Scriptures are not the light *at which* we stare. The Scriptures provide the light *in which* we see—in which we see everything else.

Administrative Highlights

Instead of shirts on a line, a better analogy for what we are seeking to do is to think of each subject as a spoke in a wheel, and with the axle being Christ.

So the vision of Logos School is to see education as having the same point, the same end, the same *telos*, as the Christian life does. If education is preparation for life, then Christian education needs to be preparation for Christian life. And what is the point of a Christian life? It is to grow up into the likeness of Jesus Christ, the only true human being who ever lived.

We were created in the image of God at the beginning, but when our first parents disobeyed and fell into sin, that divine

image (while still *there*) was heavily damaged. This is what it means to be a member of the fallen human race. The image of God is still present in us, but it has been busted. The Adamic glory was broken, shattered. But in His grace, God sent a second Adam in order to start the human race over again, so that we might be enabled to grow up into true human beings.

This is why a classical education is not vocational training (although there is nothing wrong with vocational training *per se*). We are not teaching students how to get a *job*, but rather how to get a *life*. And because the only true life is found in Jesus Christ, this means that every subject needs to point to Him. Every teacher must model Him. Every board policy must be built upon Him.

So what is the point of classical Christian education? It is nothing less than the restoration of the image of God, which means we must be constantly grounded on the gospel.

Vale, Magistra

An enthusiastic “*Salvete discipuli*” greeted myriad Logos students over the past 27 years as Mrs. Julie Garfield entered their elementary classroom for the daily Latin lesson. Too soon it is time for all of us to say “*Vale, Magistra*” as Julie retires from Logos School.

Julie has been a fixture at Logos since the beginning, as wife to founding superintendent Tom Garfield. Each of their four children graduated from Logos: Carolyn '97, Seth '00, Kajsja '01, and Kathryn '05. Julie taught Latin to all but Carolyn, as well as one of her 11 grandchildren.

Julie Olsen grew up in Moscow, attending Lena Whitmore Elementary and Moscow High School. After two years at the Lutheran Bible Institute in Seattle, she returned to Moscow to attend the University of Idaho. Julie received her bachelor’s degree in English Literature in 1977 (ironically, with a secondary teaching endorsement, given her later emphasis in elementary teaching). That same year she married Tom Garfield. She earned a master’s degree in English Literature in 1981, the year Logos School was established.

Julie’s introduction to Latin was through her eldest, Carolyn, helping her fledgling Latin student much like many Logos moms have done with their children over the years. “Languages interested me,” Julie said. “I’d had a lot of French and Spanish.” Other than a one year class in Latin, taught by Doug Wilson, Julie never had any formal training.

Julie was the third Latin teacher at Logos, following in the pioneering footsteps of Doug Wilson and Martha Sebring. In 1991, Martha moved on. With her youngest starting preschool, Julie stepped into the breach.

Five days a week, Julie entered third, fourth, fifth, and sixth grade classrooms to teach students Latin for 30-45 minutes. She emphasized learning to think about and solve problems, using vocabulary and grammar to reinforce English.

“I think people would be really surprised if they walked into a classroom and saw me cut loose,” she said. She incorporated singing and dancing into the Latin curriculum. Drama and music have been an integral part of the Garfield household over the years.

“Little kids (third graders) are much more enthusiastic and energetic,” she said. “They love you just because.” Yet she especially enjoyed working with sixth graders. “They are just moving into the dialectic stage,” she said. “They challenge you more.” The dialectic stage is when children begin to look for connections between facts and subjects, leading to a more argumentative tendency.

Julie said the most rewarding part of her job was the students—“the delight of interacting with them,” she said. “They were a gift to me.”

Thank you, Julie, for your years of valuable ministry to the students of Logos School. You were a gift to us.
