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# Reflections from a Grateful Alum

Like old friends, Logos School and I have grown up together. In 1981, I was a stout, shiny-faced four year old with shocking bangs just about to embark on my educational voyage, and Logos was a not-so-shiny, slightly wobbly new school with a shocking amount of hutzpah. In a church basement with a few dedicated parents and some unpaid teachers, Logos set out to try something that was both totally new and yet also totally tried and true. It just hadn't been tried for a great, long while.

In 1948, Dorothy Sayers published a short essay called the Lost Tools of Learning, in which she argued for a return to an older method of education - fully Medieval in fact -and she argues that this would ironically produce a generation of students more equipped for modern life than the products of the modern educational system. In the course of her essay she says this:

“It is in the highest degree improbable that the reforms I propose will ever be carried into effect . . . if we are to produce a society of educated people, fitted to preserve their intellectual freedom amid the complex pressures of our modern society, we must turn back the wheel of progress some four or five hundred years, to the point at which education began to lose sight of its true object, towards the end of the Middle Ages.”

For Sayers, this was all merely speculative since she was convinced no one would ever be brave/rash/interested enough to try it. Little did she suspect that fifty years later, in the panhandle of Idaho of all places, her hypothesis would be tested out . . . on me as well as a handful-that-grew-to-a-crowd of other intrepid guinea pigs.

Over the last thirty-seven years, both Logos and I have done quite a lot of growing up; although we both remember each other's awkward years and have the photos and stories to prove it. Logos went on to become the flagship of a very significant educational movement, and I went on to get married, have five children, enroll them all in Logos, and then come back again myself to teach. I've seen Logos from nearly every angle there is to see it from - student, mom, teacher . . . and I'm more than ever thankful for the crazy dedication and faith of my parents and the other visionaries who sacrificed so much to build this school.

I love that in the same way I am still the same person as that little four year old, the much-more-mature Logos School my children attend is the Logos I remember.

It is still focused on the same goals, it still has the same vision, and it is still striving to do something simultaneously both new and old as it seeks to equip students to faithfully love God with all their hearts, souls, and minds. And I think one of the greatest proofs of the success of Logos is how many alums are back with our own kids - wanting to see them receive the same faithful education that we received.

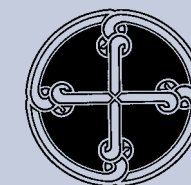

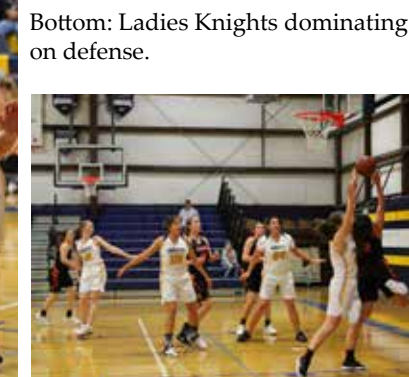

# The Count of Monte Cristo

From poverty to instant wealth, in the matter of a minute the Count of Monte Cristo's life was changed forever. The Logos varsity drama produced of *The Count of Monte Cristo* the first week of November.

Thanks to Mrs. Lloyd, the director of this year's musical, the cast was able to pull off this never-before-seen musical. Nate Miller, who played the Count, expressed the feelings of the whole cast, saying, "One of my favorite parts of the play was Mrs. Lloyd. Edmond then gets thrown into prison by Villefort (Titus Postma).

heartbreak. It was a scene that sent shivers down my spine. It was interesting to play a part very similar to Job, but with a different ultimate outcome- instead of being long suffering, Edmond let his difficulties fuel his rage. The redemption in the end with Mercedes rounded off a well-told story," Nate Miller said.

Edmond then meets a priest named Faria (Bennett Schlect), who gives Edmond a treasure map just before he dies. Edmond then switches places with Faria and is dumped into the ocean instead of the actual dead body, making his escape! Edmond enlists the help of a pirate named Jacobo (Jake Hughes) and makes his way to the Isle of Monte Cristo and finds the treasure, 10 million francs! Edmond renames himself the Count of Monte Cristo and uses his newfound wealth to re-enter into society, where he is unrecognized.

The Count's goal is to take revenge on all who wronged him. Because of the Count, Mondego is stabbed, Danglars is arrested, and Villefort's wife dies. You might say that there could be no happy ending to such a play as this, but there is. After the death of her abusive husband, Mercedes reunites with Edmond and the play closes with their wedding and justice for all.

The cast performed on several nights, including a dinner theater. The writers of the musical, Matt and Joanna Pace, flew in to see the debut performance of their work. Congratulations to the drama department on another successful season!

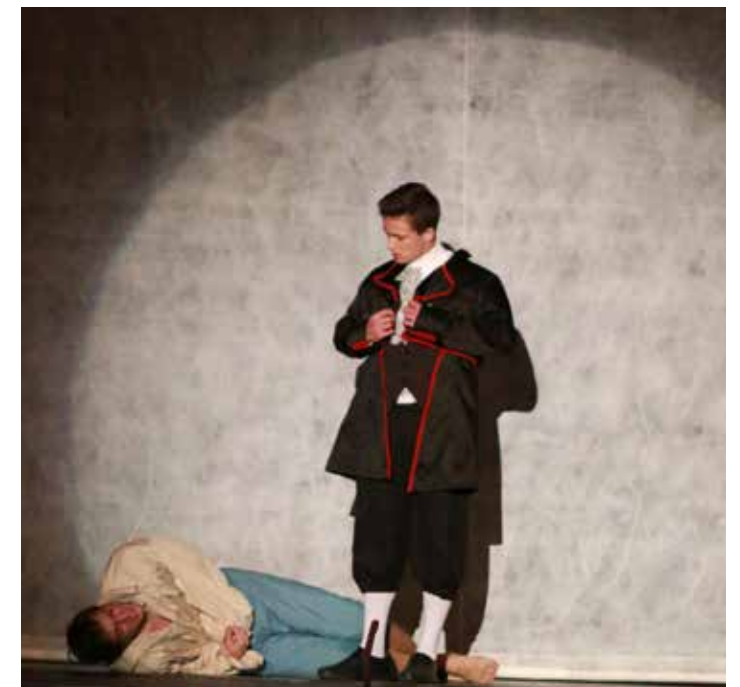

The 17 spectacular items/packages up for bid in the Live Auction drew enthusiastic bidding,
