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The Importance of Biblical Worldview

How do we measure whether or not our vision is coming to fruition? That was the question discussed at one particular school board meeting this past fall. Having a mission and vision requiring the extravagant work of God’s Spirit in order to attain it is one thing. Knowing what faithful steps are necessary to achieve that same mission and vision, as well as the assessment procedures along the way to determine how effective you are at getting there, well, that’s another.

Part of our vision at Logos School is to graduate young men and women who think clearly and listen carefully with discernment and understanding. Our desire is that they would recognize cultural influences as distinct from biblical, and that they be unswayed towards evil by the former. This objective is not just for our students, but for our staff as well. As difficult a task this may be, by God’s grace, the faithful direction of parents, and our obedience to the things God has called us to at Logos, our staff and board are working to see this become a reality, for generations to come.

In this effort to assess what we value, three pastors who serve together on the Logos School Board recently constructed a new worldview test. It consists of 25 true/false questions all relating to primary issues of our culture today. Topics within the test range from the infallibility of scripture to marriage. It is administered to freshmen, upon their entrance to high school, and then again during their senior year. Their results will be individually tracked and then comparisons made, assessing growth after four years of a classical Christian education. It is worth mentioning that teachers participate in taking the test as well, since we believe that our students are becoming like their teachers.

At our annual meeting this year, the Logos School Board assessed the outcome of the test after its first pass. While comparisons are yet to be made from the same student’s results, we were able to

observe that senior students scored noticeably higher than freshmen. The results were encouraging as it was clear from data gathered, there is wisdom gained from an experience at Logos.

Furthermore, we are moving beyond what can be seen just during high school and considering the distant future. We are now making plans to present this same worldview test to alumni, incrementally in years to come, to see whether or not their Christian worldview changes, using their results from high school as a reference point.

While this new worldview test does not secure the desired outcome we pray for as we train students with an entirely Christian worldview, it is one component of assessment that will help us discern whether or not we are seeing our vision statement fulfilled. We pray that as we administrate such assessments they will prove helpful as we strive to be faithful in all God has entrusted us at Logos, prayerfully seeing students equipped for leadership in their homes, churches, businesses, and communities, and loving the Lord with all their hearts, minds, souls and strength.

15 Faithful Years at Logos

After 15 years of serving as a second-grade teacher of Logos School, Connie Kimmell is retiring. The best part of her job is three-fold, she said. “I love ‘my’ kiddos each year, and watching their achievements is so fulfilling; then I enjoy the interaction I get to have with their families; and, of course, I am so blessed by those who have mentored me and the teachers I’ve been blessed to teach along-side.”

She has had the pleasure of teaching sibling upon sibling in families. She will be missing a few of the “tail-ends” of families with her retirement. It has been her joy to watch the “lights turn on” when her students would grasp a concept, their progress, and their excitement about learning. “It’s so fulfilling to realize that what we are teaching is having such a great impact,” she said. It is a highlight to have former students come back to see her and reminisce about second grade.

The Kimmells became part of Logos School when their children, Katie, Sam (‘08) and Emma (‘10) started attending. She was an aide for BJ Loyd when her youngest, Emma, was in second grade and really loved it. She had been a substitute in the third grade, as well, but loved second grade more.

With an opening for a part-time second grade teaching position, Mrs. BJ Loyd was quick to put Connie’s name in the pool for consideration. Connie hadn’t really considered teaching as a career, but somehow was convinced to interview for the position and was hired. When asked what inspired her to be a teacher, she said, “My Granny was a teacher and always thought I should be one.” Once she started teaching at Logos, she fell in love with her job and her students. Also, her own kids were at the school, so that was an added treat. “We loved the school, so that made it easy,” she said.

Connie grew up on the family farm in Viola and is the 4th generation on the farm, her kids are 5th, and her grandkids the 6th. She married Paul Kimmell in 1984 and they live in the farmhouse that her great-grandparents built in 1913.

This is where they raised their three children, (Katie, Sam, and Emma) and they also have eight (soon to be nine) grandchildren, (Raina, Janelie, Eleana, Gigi, Avery, Brynn, Jase and Cora).

Why retire now? “So, retirement... my health has been a challenge this year, so God made it pretty clear a couple months ago that I just couldn’t continue to battle my health and do a great job of teaching. It was obviously time.” Connie is looking forward to spending more time with her grandkids and traveling to see her children not living here. She is also looking forward to working at her graphic design business that she has put on the side for a few years. “Plus, maybe I’ll come back and do some subbing in the classrooms or help with reading groups; who knows!!”

Connie has taught nearly 300 students over the past 15 years. “Wow, that seems impossible, but I’ve been so privileged to teach these kids and blessed by each of their families,” she expressed. She has developed a cohesive science curriculum that is compiled into one large book-published by Canon Press.

STATE SUMMARY--IDAHO HIGH SCHOOL MOCK TRIAL

In the 25th year of our Mock Trial program, the Logos Knights proved once again that we are a formidable force in the courtroom. The Mock Trial competition is a demanding blend of tireless case preparation, logic, persuasion, quick thinking, and maintaining poise in the face of intense pressure and adversity. Few activities rival the complexity of Mock Trial, given its ever-shifting layers of law, contested facts, and storytelling from competing perspectives—all in the face of persistent challenges from advocates on the opposing side. No two mock trials are alike. At the Idaho Supreme Court on Friday afternoon, following six intense rounds of competition, Logos emerged as the Idaho State Champions.

Logos qualified both its Mock Trial teams for the state competition; we were two among twelve teams from around Idaho plus a couple from Montana. The tournament began with four preliminary rounds on Wednesday and Thursday, Logos B faced Timberline, Ambrose B, Lewiston, and Mountain Home. Logos A faced Ambrose B, Centennial B, Centennial A, and Timberline. Following Round Four, judges honored individual participants. They recognized seventeen outstanding witnesses, including Sophie Spencer and Mallory Struble from Logos B and Josiah Rauch from Logos A. Among the twenty outstanding attorney recipients were Ava Driskill, Kalkidan Meyer, Alice Miller and Elanor Story of Logos B, and Nate Miller and Bennett Schlect of Logos A.

Also following Round Four came the big announcement, when the four semifinal teams were named: Mountain Home, Ambrose A, Logos B, and Logos A. This forced a round of Logos A vs. B, and our A-team emerged victorious in a 3-1 split ballot. Judges recognized attorney Nate Miller and witness Laina Wyrick for their outstanding performances.

This set the stage for a classic championship showdown at the Idaho Supreme Court on Friday afternoon, between Logos A and Ambrose A. This is the ninth consecutive year that Logos and Ambrose were the two finalists. The Hon. Robyn M. Brody, Justice of the Idaho Supreme Court, presided over the trial before a packed Supreme Court gallery. Logos prevailed in a close split decision. Judges recognized attorney Nate Miller and witness Josiah Rauch as the

outstanding individual performances. This is Logos's 18th Idaho State Championship in the program's 25-year history. The win qualifies Logos to represent our state at the National High School Mock Trial Championships in Athens, GA.

Varsity Boys Basketball

Humble and hardworking. That was the motto of the Logos varsity boys basketball team this season, and those are traits they lived out during one of the most successful years in program history.

The senior-led Knights claimed their first district title and reached the semifinals of the Class 1A Division II state tournament before finishing in fifth place. They also marched through Whitepine League Division II play unbeaten to win the league.

It was quite the rebound from last year's 3-13 finish, and it was driven by steady veteran leadership.

Ben Euhus, Nate Miller, Nic Minudri, and Bennett Schlect, all seniors, were motivated to make big strides after a challenging 2017-18 campaign. Alongside junior guard Isaac Blum, they proved to be anchors on and off the court. Euhus and Miller provided length and muscle in the paint, Minudri led the Knights in assists and steals from his point guard spot, and Schlect and Blum tied for the team high with 38 made 3-pointers each.

Three other juniors (Rory Wilson, Cam Vis, and Jonah Grieser) and four freshmen swingers (Will Casebolt, Jasper Whitling, Roman Nuttbrock, and Shawn Schneider) rounded out the roster and helped Logos (16-7) outscore its opponents by an average of 11 points per game. Euhus was named Whitepine League Player of the Year after averaging 13 points and 11 rebounds per game. Coach Matt Whitling, in his 18th year at the helm, earned WPL Coach of the Year honors. He was assisted by Cotton Whitling and JV coach Arden Skoglund.

Logos' only previous trip to State was in 2015, when the boys took fourth. That year they reached the consolation championship game, and this season they came close to punching a ticket to the state final.

In the semifinals against Garden Valley, Logos nearly overcame a 14-point halftime deficit before falling 54-48. The Knights then lost to Genesis Prep in the third-place game.

Logos rolled through league play 10-0, winning by more than 20 points per game. They beat Deary 47-22 in the District II tournament title game to earn their way to State. The varsity boys were also crowned the academic state champions for the second consecutive year with a cumulative GPA of 3.91.
