If you are a student at a classical school, a host of people are putting

in a lot of time and effort, trying to turn you into something. But I'm sure that the most pressing concern for you is not the techniques they are using ... you are probably more interested in what the end goal is. You want to know about the final product.

So what is everyone trying to turn you into? This is pretty simple, actually. The various people involved with your education, from your parents to your principal to your teachers, are all trying to work together to turn you into a leader. They want you to become the kind of person who rises to the top like cream, the kind of person

that others will instinctively follow, the kind of person who stands out from the crowd. They don't want to work on transforming you into an unquestioning little cog in the machine, a drone for the hive, an unremarkable face in the crowd. They want to see you out in front, making a difference, effecting change. But that, of course, is only half the battle. It's no good being a leader if you have no idea where you're going or why. A leader with a crowd behind him, wandering around with no clear direction, is not exactly a win.

Two years from now, as you sit in a college classroom, we hope that your professors and your classmates will notice there's something different about you. But, believe it or not, we aren't hoping that you will stand out because of your IQ or your SAT scores. What we want others to be struck by

is the fact that you actually know what you think and why you think it. We want them to be surprised by the fact that you're confident in your opinions, and you don't mind defending them against all comers. We want them to see that you are a person whose opinions are actually all consistent with one another, that you defend your political opinions, for example, with the same reasoning that you use to defend your philosophical and artistic and historical and literary opinions. In fact, we want them to see you arguing for your political opinions based on your historical opinions. Or arguing for your artistic opinions based on your philosophical opinions. We want them to see you argue about history from literature, or about literature from art, and all without really changing the subject. We want them to see you evaluate all the new information you'll be receiving, sift it, reject some of it, keep some of it, and fit what you keep into your already existing frame of knowledge.

This is much more rare a skill than you may realize. And, when someone possesses it, they immediately stand out from the rest of the crowd. We want that to be you—and that is what the point of all of this actually is. ☪



JUNIOR HIGH CROSS COUNTRY

Junior high XC had a very successful season. First-year coach Josh Wright led a fine group of young runners as they learned to train hard and run fast. Eighth-grader Jonathan Morrill was a consistent top finisher for the boys, with four 4th place finishes and at least a top-ten place in each race. Another 8th grader, Garret Farrell, helped to lead a strong contingent of boys with three top-ten finishes himself.

Even with a lot of boys who had never played before, the team finished with a winning record of 4-3. Things started off with a bang as the boys won the very first football game in Logos history by picking up a win at Genesee. The following week, on our very own home field, the Knights drew a remarkable crowd and our boys put up a strong showing against the Troy Trojans. The boys lost that week, but later in the season they claimed two home victories and laid a foundation for what we hope will be a long tradition of success with Logos Football.

HIGH SCHOOL CROSS COUNTRY

The HS Cross Country teams had a great season. They completed the regular season at the Potlatch Invitational holding first place in the district rankings. Freshman Nate Plotner led the boys and Sophomore Clara Anderson led the girls. The boys' team also benefitted from the senior leadership of Jake Hughes and Isaac Blum. Top performances of the year include Nate Plotner claiming 3rd at the Kamiah Invite and finishing 5th and 6th in some very competitive races. Sophomore Solomon Howard captured three top ten finishes. Another sophomore, Theo Sentz, also consistently placed high. Coach Casebolt speaks very highly of her team: "The boys' team came into this season already fast, after several of them put in a good amount of running in the preseason. They worked very hard to get into peak form for the District and State races." Nate Plotner won Districts, leading five team members to the top ten for a team win also! The boys went on to place 2nd at State, with Nate, Solomon, and Alex Blum in

the top 20. These guys pushed each other to perform their best at every practice and every meet, and that led to a 39-second spread between the top five runners at State."

Coach Casebolt also liked the outlook for her girl's team: "We have a full team of seven girls and the season has been very successful with two meet wins! We struggled with some injury and illness, but these girls are determined and hard-working, and they are getting fast! We had three girls rank top ten in the district, which put us in an excellent position for the District Meet." Clara Anderson had two big victories at the Kamiah and Seaport Invites. She was one of the top performers in the district all season. She led a strong group of girls, including junior Kayte Casebolt and freshman Josephine Wyrick.

Clara went on to win Districts, with Kayte taking 4th, for a 2nd place team finish. The girls went on to finish 5th at State, with Clara and Kayte in the top 20. What a great season for all our runners!

High school volleyball coach Jessica Evans once again led the girls with assistant coaches Jim Becker and Heather Wilson. The team is young but Coach Evans appreciated the hard work of her veteran players. "I'm proud of how the seniors have shown leadership this season in communication and encouragement on the court as well as

Logos Drama Brings *Much Ado About Nothing* to Life

What good story doesn't contain the crucial elements of intrigue and reveal, betrayal and faithfulness, love and spite? No one can combine these elements into a masterful story so well as Shakespeare does in his comedy of *Much Ado About Nothing*.

The story, which was set in the West, begins when Don Pedro, the prince of Aragon, along with his good friends Claudio and Benedick and his troop of soldiers, visit his friend Leonato, the mayor of Messina. Claudio is in love with Leonato's daughter Hero, and woos her with the help of Don Pedro. Before the wedding, the four of them set a trap so that Benedick and Beatrice (who before had never met "but there's a skirmish of wit between them") are successfully tricked into loving each other. At the same time,

Claudio and Don Pedro are deceived by Don Pedro's villainous brother Don John into thinking Hero was disloyal and shaming her at the wedding. When it is later revealed that she was truly innocent, Claudio is heartbroken. As restitution, Leonato says that Claudio may marry Hero's cousin instead. The next day, all is resolved. Claudio finds that the real Hero is still alive, Benedick and Beatrice finally profess their love for each other, and Don John is caught.

This year was different for Logos drama because there was a double cast for most of the major roles. The varsity cast performed three nights and the JV performed at the Saturday matinee. The cast, directed by Mrs. Danae Harlow and assisted by Miss Elli Sensing, brought forth solid performances despite having a short practice season. However, it never would have turned out if it weren't for the crew: our lights and sound techs, stage managers, and the costumers led by Mrs. Chelsea Niemeyer.

The double cast consisted of Benedick (John Sensing/Nate Plotner), Beatrice (Louisa Miller/Esther Niemeyer), Don Pedro (Judah Rauch/Richard

Crawford), Leonato (Jake Hughes/Eddrick Moya), Claudio (Joseph Ahmann), Hero (Kalkidan Meyer/Kayte Casebolt), Margaret (Sarah Rosendahl/Maggie Anderson), and Ursula (Eleanor Story/Mallory Struble). The villains were Don John (Cody Stevens), Borachio (Elijah Snell), and Conrade (Kailee Evans). The play was not without its comedic relief. Dogberry (Josiah Rauch), his elderly sidekick Verges (John Crawford), and their watch were a ridiculous sensation every night. The supporting roles were aptly filled by Luke Hughes, Isaac White, Judah Merkle, Zach Atwood, Signe Holloway, Alice Miller, River Sumpter, Rilla Story, and Payton Comis.

Despite Shakespeare containing difficult language, several audience members remarked how well the cast did in portraying the story. Mrs. Harlow said, "Shakespeare is not easy to learn and to portray, but these students brought the words and story to life."

After the last performance, Jake remarked, "That's the moment all of the well-spent preparation was leading toward, and each successful performance was extremely satisfying because we know that we have blessed our audience with what we prepared for since the beginning of the season." ☕
