Dealing with Denominational Differences

As a non-denominational school, Logos aims to offer all students an excellent education, grounded on Christ's Lordship over all subjects. In the light of that lofty goal, parents and students may wonder how denominational differences are addressed as they arise.

First, let's look at what Paul had to say on the matter. 1 Corinthians 12 gives an inspired analogy about how the body of Christ works. It's worth mentioning that this conversation is for those who are part of the body (v. 13); we have enough trouble getting along as a body and don't need body-image issues from

some other body. The body is made up of every true believer, since every member serves under the head, which is Christ.

To dissect this analogy further, the body works best when the feet do feet things, eyes do eye things, and hands do hand things. Where we really start stepping on toes is when (as Paul notes) the eyes tell off the hands and the head tells off the feet. Suddenly we find ourselves in an autoimmune nightmare, where the body attacks itself and ceases to function.

Stepping out of the analogy and back to the subject of denominations, how will differences within the body be dealt with when the feet want everybody else to be just like them? As families consider investing their children in Logos, they certainly wish for an environment

of perfect spiritual unity and a body that knows its role. But maturity is a process that stretches wineskins and occasionally bursts them. The goal at Logos is to provide a place where Christian conversation can happen, where differences can be discussed, where discussion inspires further study, and where that study blesses the discussions you have a family dinner.

When these differences arise, how should you deal with them? **FIRST** of all, be thankful! You have been invited on a problem-solving mission and have a great opportunity to show your kids how it should be done (please also note you might demonstrate how it should not be done, though that will offer you the opportunity to demonstrate reconciliation). **SECOND**, make sure that you understand the question, concern, or issue. Most Christian denominations have a rich heritage in the faith, so try to understand the history behind the difference. **THIRD**, know your Bible, not just John 3:16, and not just for proof texts. Read your Bible seeking the Living Word, the One who was with God in the beginning and will see us through to the end. Remember that all Scripture points to Him, as was demonstrated on the road to Emmaus. **ADDITIONALLY**, remember that conflict in the body isn't always bad; in fact, all healthy conflict leads to growth. A visit to the gym doesn't do the body any good unless it breaks down some muscle to inspire new muscle to grow. Bodies are designed that way. **FINALLY**, Paul closes this analogy with the ingredient that should be in all Christian discussion: honor (v. 24-26). A deep appreciation for how God designed the body should appear a lot like love. The staff and administration of Logos School strive for all interactions within the body to reflect the honor God has placed on it, because we are a witness to the world (John 13:35). ☪

Girls' Basketball

ALL ABOUT DEFENSE

The 2019-20 season was one of big improvement for the girls' basketball team. Last year's record of 3-9 in the White Pine League jumped to 8-4 in the league and 9-7 overall in 2020. The hard work that the team put into the off-season showed as the team improved in every facet of the game. But the biggest improvement came on the defensive end as the team saw a significant reduction in the opponent's points per game. This led to a significant increase in the number of opportunities to win, and the ladies capitalized on those opportunities.

Even with no seniors on the roster, the team did return a number of key performers from the previous season. Captains Kirstin Wambeke and Lucia Wilson helped the team form an identity that drove them to success on the court. The Juniors provided steady leadership.

Kirstin led the team in scoring and provided confidence in the backcourt. The team's most experienced player, she played multiple roles on offense

and defense to help the team succeed. Every opponent recognized her ability as she was White Pine League 1st team selection. She averaged double digits in scoring, with two games of 19 points.

Lucia Wilson was the team's leading rebounder. She had 7 games with 10 plus rebounds, including a 16-rebound performance. She provided strong interior post defense and a steady presence in the backcourt vs opposing presses.

Sophomore Sydney Miller handled the point guard position. She was the team's second leading scorer, including her best performance of 19 points in one game. Her improvement was a major key in the team's overall success. Junior Naomi Michaels was the team's top defender, and she provided a steady presence on the offensive end. Another key to the improvement of this year's team was the depth on the team. Lydia Urquidez, Julia Urquidez and Ameera Wilson all provided quality options.

Coach Lopez was assisted by JV Coach Elly Kline and Mr. Eric Meyer. The coaching staff is very excited to have such an experienced team to face the new challenges of 2020-21.



Boys' Basketball

NEW CHALLENGES FOR THE 2019-20 BOYS' BASKETBALL TEAM


Nineteenth-year coach Matt Whitling had to retool from one of the most successful seasons in the program's history. The team graduated four senior starters from a team that won both the league and district championship, advancing to the program's second state tournament appearance.

With only one returning starter, the team looked to new players in new roles at every position. When Coach Whitling asked Co-Captain Isaac Blum to make the switch from shooting guard to center for the benefit of the team, the lone returning starter willingly embraced the challenge. Other seniors, Co-Captain Jonah Grieser and Rory Wilson, had to step into leadership roles on a very young team that would ask a lot of a talented but young group of sophomores.

The Seniors stepped up, especially in rebounding. Blum scored in double digits six times, including one game of 24 points. He doubled his rebounding total from the previous year. Jonah Grieser also moved from the perimeter to more of an inside role. He

led the team in rebounding and shot 35% from behind the arc. Rory Wilson gave the team some valuable minutes in the post, providing some interior muscle and leading the team in rebounds per minute.

This left some key roles for some young players to fill, and this year's sophomores were up to the challenge. Roman Nuttbrock became the primary point guard, and he did a fine job steadying the team with his ball-handling. Nuttbrock averaged 18 ppg and shot 35% from the 3-point line. Will Casebolt led the team in scoring at 19 ppg while shooting 40% from beyond the stripe. The two sophomores shared team MVP honors. Another sophomore starter, Jasper Whitling, provided solid defense and led the team in assists.

In order to sustain the level of success from last year, Coach Whitling had challenged this team to work hard in the off-season, and the team made a real commitment to developing their shooting. It showed. The boys ended with 139 made threes and shooting 33% from the 3-point line. The boys finished the year with a record of 8-2 in the league, which was good for second place, and 13-7 overall. The team earned their second straight academic state championship with a cumulative GPA of 3.842.

Logos Christmas Concert

On December 13, an audience of a thousand took their seats in the sanctuary of the Moscow Nazarene Church. They had come to watch children, grandchildren, nieces, nephews, and family friends celebrate the birth of a King in song.

The lights dimmed, chimes rang out, a prophecy was read, and the students of the Logos Chamber Choir entered into the large, domed space, carrying candles and singing a Latin Christmas chant by St. Basil from the 4th century.

Thus began the annual Logos Christmas program, featuring the students of every grade from preschool through 12th singing in praise of the birth of Christ. The Chamber Choir (a new high school honors choir) was followed by the rest of the high school choir processing in and filling the darkened sanctuary with sounds of Christmas. The concert progressed through the various age groups singing, interspersed with Scripture readings and carols sung by the audience; the theme of the concert

printed on the front of the program soon emerged: Christ the king is born. Whether it was the preschool through first graders singing with hand motions, the second and third graders adding rhythmic clapping to a Spanish carol, or the high school choir closing the concert lifting up the enthroned and reigning Christ with Beethoven's Hallelujah, all was intended to point to the truth that Jesus was born the King of kings, and is King over all today. Our goal was to bless and encourage our audience with this joyful Christmas truth. ☪

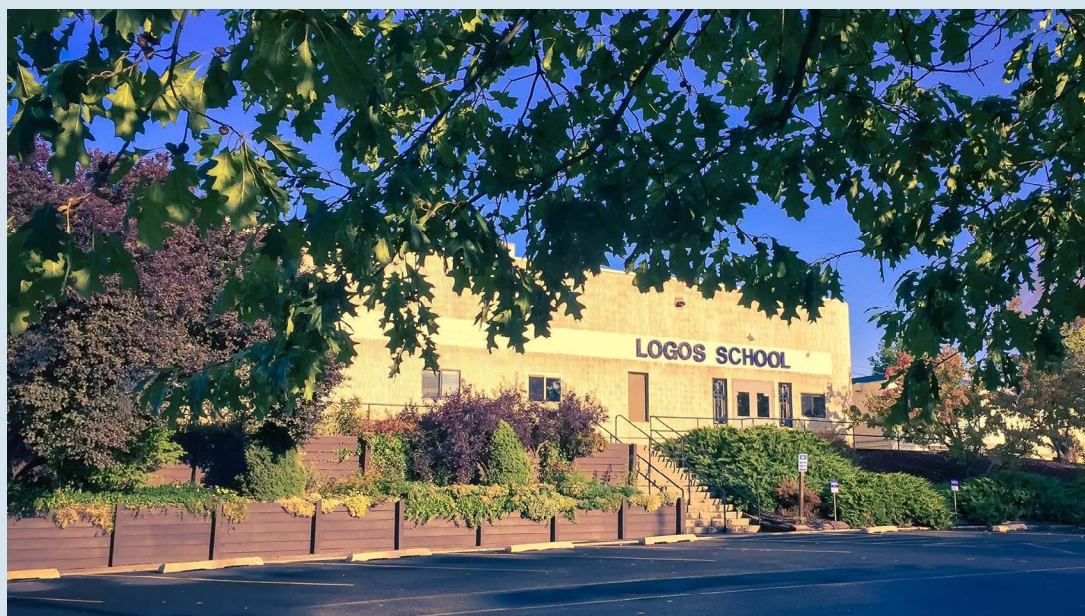
