

Room to Grow

A day of small beginnings: in 1981, the Logos student body consisted of just 18 students.

n September 1981, Logos School first opened its doors to 18 students in the basement of the Paradise Hills Church of God.

The goal was to provide a classical, Christ-centered education. The school quickly outgrew the borrowed space, and six years later, after extensive prayer and remodeling, moved into a former roller skating rink.

Over the years, we have added the gym, four portable classroom units, the "little house" office and library, as

well as building additional classrooms into the lunchroom and stage space. We expanded to add a second class per grade, and in 2018, we moved our preschool and kindergarten classes to the Nazarene Church. And the students kept coming!

In anticipation of continued, substantial growth, the Logos School board decided in May 2020 to begin preparing for a Logos School District.

New student registration in the spring of 2021 made it clear that the school needed to add another full class in preschool through third grade. The search for an additional elementary school space intensified and a location was found on the south end of town.













In a few short weeks, the lease was signed, the remodeling plans drawn up, the permits issued, and the extensive remodeling project began...with just three months till the start of the school year! With Adam Berry at the helm of a solid student work crew, the construction team completed demo, framed walls, hung sheetrock, and painted. They then installed flooring, electrical, plumbing, and playground turf.

Four new teachers and an administrative assistant were hired, and Mrs. Tracie Handel took on the role of lower elementary principal to oversee grades preschool through second. By mid-August, teachers began moving into the freshly painted three first grade and three second grade classrooms; a stage was built in the great room for assemblies, and a library took shape. Generous parents

donated and built the playground structure. And on August 23, 2021, the Logos South Campus opened its doors to 92 first and second graders.

In forty years, Logos School has grown from 18 students to 567. The wait list continues to lengthen as we stretch to make space for every family eager to be a part of the Logos School mission: to provide a classical and Christ-centered education in order to graduate young men and women who are equipped to shape culture through wise and victorious Christian living.

High School Football

In the 2021 fall season, the Logos Knights fielded their first ever varsity high school football team. The team was led by head coach Nick Holloway and assistant coaches Skyler Cracraft, JC Christenson, Stan Miller, George Landis, and Jason Elmore. The boys finished the season 3 and 6 overall, 1 and 6 in league. It was a foundational year for both the players and coaches, and despite a losing record, the program shows strong potential for future years.

The team had a strong turnout for its first season, with over thirty athletes across the varsity and JV rosters. For

the majority of these young men, it was either their first or second season playing any sort of football. The team had a strong group of underclassmen, and everyone is excited to see the program develop in the years to come. The team will be losing eleven seniors, leaving lots of opportunity for these younger players in the next season.

The team entered the season eager to compete, and proved that they were ready to play. In their opening game, the Knights defeated Timberline High School. The first touchdown in Logos's varsity program history was a pass from sophomore Jack Driskill to senior Solomon Howard. After setting the tone early, the Knights continued to push through the game and finished with a score of 58-26. The Knights continued to fight hard throughout the season, earning two





more victories over Troy and Lewis-County. Their hard work will continue to pay off as a foundation for future seasons.

Several athletes received recognition for their achievements over the course of the season. Senior Solomon Howard received all league honorable mention as a defensive back, and senior Aiden Elmore received the same as a running back. Senior Liev Comis received all league second-team as a wide receiver. Sophomore quarterback Jack Driskill finished the season in the nation's top ten for total passing yards in eight-man football.

The JV team was also able to compete in eight games over the course of the season. Led by Stan Miller and George Landis, the JV boys finished the season with a record of 3-3. With a focus on skill development, the JV players worked hard and their coaches were pleased with the improvement that they showed

throughout the season. Many of the players on the JV team were also able to get some playing time in the varsity games, and the JV team practiced with and traveled with the varsity team. The JV boys are looking forward to getting more playing time at the varsity level in the upcoming season.

The Knights' motto of "Gratitude, Sacrifice, Excellence" showed in the players and the coaching staff throughout the team's first season. The work that was put in during those twelve weeks will continue to help the future of Logos's football program. As the underclassmen move up through the ranks, they will be a force to be reckoned with throughout the league. This was shown in the brotherly love and the trust that the team shared, and their potential to do great things both on and off of the field will only grow as time goes on.



High School Volleyball

The 2021 volleyball season was Logos' second year of competition in Division 1 of the White Pine League. Head Coach Jessica Evans led the program for her 28th consecutive year. The year started with a series of losses against some of the strongest competition in the league and led to a slower start to the season than the team had hoped. Throughout the year, the girls battled through many obstacles and injuries. The perseverance paid off as the year ended with a strong showing at the District tournament, where they earned victories over Lapwai, Prairie and Kamiah, all teams they had lost to during the season. Those victories allowed the girls the opportunity to face Genesee for a chance to advance to a state play-in game.

This year's team was led by three experienced senior captains: Annika Haney, Lina Jankovic, and Ameera Wilson.

The experience of the three seniors was supported by some strong performances from underclassmen such as junior Lilly Leidenfrost and sophomore Lucia Spencer. Lilly had a strong season and was awarded all-league 1st team, and Lucia Spencer earned an all-league second-team selection. Three other juniors: libero Ellie Brower, middle hitter GraceAnn Vanderploeg, and outside hitter Emilia Meyer rounded out the varsity roster.

The team finished the season with a record of 4-10 in the league and 7-12 overall.

Special honors went to Lina Jankovic, who led the team in blocks and kill percentage. Annika Haney was awarded the Knight Award, and Elli Brower led the team in digs and earned the team's defensive player of the year. Lucy Spencer was the team leader in kills. Lily Leidenfrost was selected the team's Most Valuable Player.

First-year Coach Naomi Tate led the JV team, with strong performances from Evie Grauke, Signe Holloway, and Eve Rench.









Girls 1A State Cross Country Champions 2021

She knew they would be fast, maybe the fastest girls' cross country squad Logos has ever assembled. Paula Casebolt could see her team had the talent, the depth, the drive to justify setting the bar high—state-championship high.

They just had to do the hardest part: prove it on the biggest stage. Which is exactly what the Logos girls did at the Idaho Class 1A state cross country meet in Eagle.

The Knights captured the school's first girls' cross country state championship with a narrow victory at Eagle Island State Park, adding a banner to Logos Gym to accompany three boys' state cross country titles.

"My expectations for the girls were high this year," Casebolt told her team at the postseason award banquet. "But there are always a lot of unknown variables: How much speed can we add? What kind of injuries or sicknesses will pop up? What do the southern schools look like?

"But you kept getting faster and you started to really put a distance between yourselves and your competitors."

Team MVP Sara Casebolt and senior captain Clara Anderson paced Logos with fifth- and sixth-place finishes at state, but it took a total team effort for the Knights to edge Raft River by 2 points. Alyssa Blum edged a runner from Liberty Charter by a half-second to nab 11th—gaining crucial points for the team—while freshman Lizzie Crawford held off a Raft River competitor for 22nd and Josephine Wyrick finished 24th.

The Logos girls dominated districts and beat much bigger schools, including Moscow, Pullman, and Lewiston, throughout the season. Casebolt was most impressed, though, with how her team exhibited the school's hallmark values of gratitude, sacrifice, and excellence.

"Not only do they represent Logos with excellence," the fifth-year coach said, "they lead with some really unbelievable sportsmanship and care for the other athletes on the course."

The Logos boys also had a terrific season. Led by top-20 finishers Zach Atwood and Theo Sentz, they took fourth place at state after also cruising to the district title.

The third year of the Logos junior high football program ended with a winning record of 5-1. Twenty-five athletes in grades 7 and 8 played on this year's team, as the football program continues to grow. The three teams were very competitive and traded wins and losses equally over the five week season. Eighteen of those players went on to play another seven weeks in the competitive Whitepine League. The B team ended the season at 7-3, and the A team at 4-6. Second-year coach Heather Meyer was joined by Hannah Studt this year, and the girls were led by a solid group of 8th graders: Chloe Jankovic, Heidi Johnson, Lizzie Meyer, and Hailey Wambeke, as well as Nicole Nadreau who was injured early in the season but continued as team manager. We're looking forward to seeing these girls on the court next year as they join our high school Knights!

FEED the NEED 2021



ON NOVEMBER 4, 470 Logos students worked to prepare over 10,000 meals for local food banks, clinics, and churches. Students in grades 1-12 took part in our annual Feed the Need event, in partnership with Homestead Ministries.
