The High School Boys Basketball Team Advances to State

The Logos boys basketball team had an extremely successful season. The varsity boys were led by head coach Joe Casebolt. It was Casebolt's first season as head coach, having served as the defensive coordinator the previous season. He was assisted by Arden Skoglund, Garrison Hardy, and Ben Casebolt.

The team had an exciting year, and finished the regular season 12-6 overall and 9-5 in the league. In the postseason, the boys finished third in the district tournament, and punched a ticket to state in a nail-biting play-in game against Lakeside High School where a last second shot gave the boys an exciting 66-65 victory. This was the team's first trip to state since joining the 1A division 1 classification, and the program's third trip to state in school history. The boys were defeated by Lapwai in the state semifinal and then lost a close game to Grace in the third-place game.

This was one of the most successful years in program history. The varsity team had a well-seasoned line up, with 6 of the 10 players being seniors: Will Casebolt, Ben Druffel, Aiden Elmore, Kenny Kline, Roman Nuttbrock, and Jasper Whitling. Rounding out the varsity lineup was junior Zack Atwood, sophomores Jack Driskill and Garret Farrell, and freshman Seamus Wilson. The team's leading scorer was Casebolt, who was selected for the Whitepine All-League First Team. Nuttbrock was selected for the Second Team despite suffering from an injury for a significant part of the season.

Coach Casebolt's emphasis on defense showed up on the court, as the team had several low scoring defensive battles in the postseason. It was a crucial part of the team's success.

The junior varsity team was led by Isaac Lopez, who had previously coached the junior high team the last three years. Coach Lopez was assisted by George Landis and Jimmy Schoolland. The JV team finished the season 12-6. The team was full of freshmen players, who will have a great opportunity to step into Whitepine League varsity play in the next few seasons.

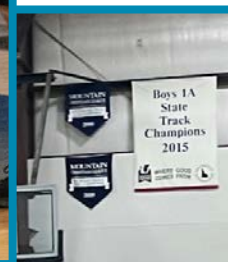

THANK YOU, *Coach Evans!*

After **28** years, **300** wins, **7** league titles, and **3** Coach of the Year awards, volleyball coach Jessica Evans is retiring from the program she built at Logos School.



Some of her fondest memories are the late-night bus rides home. While coach Jessica Evans didn't love the driving back from away matches, she always loved the singing: the glorious hymns the girls were learning in choir, the Disney favorites, the songs from "The Phantom of the Opera."

Evans is retiring after 28 years as the Logos volleyball coach, and she looks back at the early days of the program she started with a touch of nostalgia and a lot of laughter. During the first match in program history—against Garfield-Palouse in 1995—Logos's first sub off the bench ran onto the court like she would during a basketball game. Evans had forgotten to teach her players how to properly sub into a volleyball match. "Both coach and players learned a lot that year," she said, not just referring to the ups and downs of a first season in which the Knights didn't win a single game, let

alone a single match. "I've learned not to despise the day of small beginnings."

The seeds planted in those humble first years took root—from a fledgling program to five consecutive state tournament appearances from 2014-2018. The Knights won more than 300 matches and seven league titles during Evans' tenure. Three times she was honored as Whitepine League Coach of the Year.

"I loved seeing the fruit of 28 years of building a program," Evans said. That fruit can be seen in many places. She points to coaching a second generation of players who enjoy the sport and excel at it. She points to the parents who valued having their girls in a competitive sport. And she points to Little Lady Volleyball, which she started in 2014 with Jeni Leidenfrost to give Logos high school players a chance to give to the school by helping young players develop.

"The girls I've coached are going to be shaping culture as wives and moms,"



she said. "I have loved serving Logos families through coaching volleyball and prepping kids to shape culture for Christ through it. The planting, watering, and fruit of so many years of labor brings joy." ☕
