Type: Private, Christian, classical, four-year, co-educational school, founded in 1981.

Accreditation: Logos is accredited with the Association of Classical & Christian Schools (ACCS) since 2000, with reaccreditation in 2024, and is a charter member of ACCS since 1994.

Calendar: The school calendar is divided into two semesters spanning thirty-six weeks, within which are four grading periods (quarters). Classes are 50 minutes long and there are 7 periods per day, although some classes don't meet every day.

COMMUNITY

Moscow, Idaho (population 25,000) is located in the Palouse region in the northwestern part of the state, adjacent to the Washington border, about 90 miles southeast of Spokane, WA. The local community has a strong agricultural base. Logos students come from a fifty-mile radius.

This area has three universities: The University of Idaho and New St. Andrews College are located in Moscow, ID, and Washington State University is in Pullman, WA, 8 miles west.

SCHOOL GOALS: CLASSICAL

In the programs and teaching at all levels, the extracurricular activities, and the examples set by faculty and staff, Logos School strives to:

- A. Emphasize grammar, logic, and rhetoric in all subjects, with appropriate adjustments to grade level;
- B. Encourage every student to grow in a love for learning and to achieve their academic potential;
- C. Provide an orderly atmosphere conducive to the attainment of the above goals.

SCHOOL GOALS: CHRIST-CENTERED

In the programs and teaching at all levels, the extracurricular activities, and the examples set by faculty and staff, Logos School strives to:

- A. Teach all subjects in the curriculum as parts of an integrated whole with the infallible Scriptures at the center (II Timothy 3:16-17, II Corinthians 10:3-5);
- B. Provide a clear model of the biblical Christian life through our staff and board (Matthew 22:37-40);
- C. Encourage every student to begin or continue in a personal relationship with God the Father through Jesus Christ in the power of the Holy Spirit (Matthew 28:18-20).

GRADING SYSTEM

Grade point averages are based on a 4.0 scale, and are unweighted. The maximum possible GPA is 4.0. The cumulative grade point average is updated at the end of every semester. Pass/Fail classes (such as electives, music, and independent study courses) are graded E, S, U (see below) and are not used to calculate the grade point average.

CURRICULUM

The curriculum at Logos School is modeled after the classical trivium. The integration of subjects is stressed at all levels. Students are required to take four years of Rhetoric (the art of speaking and writing well). Students are expected to be able to clearly articulate their beliefs and views on various topics. Senior Rhetoric students are required to write, present, and defend a formal thesis in front of their peers and a panel of judges.

In addition to Logos classes, seniors may dual enroll in college courses. They receive one pass/fail credit toward Logos School graduation requirements for a university course.

COURSES

Bible: Church History, Biblical Interpretation, Christian Doctrine, Apologetics

English (Rhetoric and Literature): Rhetoric I, Rhetoric II, Rhetoric III, Rhetoric IV. (*Rhetoric is the art of speaking and writing well*). European Literature, American Literature, Classical Literature, British Literature

Fine Arts: Choir, various electives (see below).

Foreign Language: Latin I & II, Spanish I, II, & III

History: European History, U.S. History, Classical History

Math: Geometry, Algebra II, Pre-Calculus, Functions and Statistics, Calculus

Other: Economics, Philosophy

Science: Physical Science, Biology, Chemistry, Physics, Marine Biology

Electives (2 days a week, pass/fail): Annual, Chess, Conditioning, Civics, Drawing, Personal Finance, Athletic Training, Creative Writing, Music, Keyboarding, Health & Nutrition (*these are typical, but elective offerings vary*)

HONORS COURSES

Logos does not offer any AP courses, although some students take AP exams independently.

Honors courses and Honors Seminars are offered to meet the needs of motivated students. Honors classes cover additional topics in greater depth. Logos offers up to two honors classes per grade per semester, depending on teacher availability.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

Students receive one semester credit for each course that meets three or five days each week. Students receive one-half semester credit for each course that meets two days a week. Logos offers three types of diplomas, with different graduation requirements:
